(\$50,000 / 1000 = 50 x 4 = \$200)

Change is coming slowly to Honduras. But in many communities the average income is as little as one or two dollars per day. No matter how hard these people work, survival remains a constant struggle for the poorest of the poor.

Yet, even those who are resigned to a life of poverty and hardship still aspire to provide a better future for their children and grandchildren. You can help make that goal possible by improving their access to safe drinking water, latrines, first aid supplies and basic improvements to their modest homes.

The ONE DAY CHALLENGE is a very simple but effective concept – dedicating ONE day of *our* income to bring new hope and transformation to Hondurans who earn merely one or two dollars a day.

This year, the ONE DAY CHALLENGE is concentrating on the needs of two particularly impoverished communities, La Baranquilla and La Libertad 2. Every penny you give will go directly to helping those who need it the most, and in a way that brings lasting improvement.



Houses built from wood and sheet metal cling to the hillside in the neighbourhood of La Libertad 2, one of the poorest areas of Nueva Suyapa.

La Baranquilla

This is one of the poorest communities in the south of Honduras. Of the 100 families, 90 live in extreme poverty in homes made of plastic and wood, with plastic or thatched roofs and dirt floors. There is no potable water or electricity.



Mostly men work as day labourers in melon farms or as brick layers, making an average of \$1 per day, and usually working 3 days a week.

CRWRC partner Cosecha (Harvest) is working with church leaders to address the spiritual needs of the community and to provide a nutrition program for children under 5 years of age.

As part of the needs assessment, some families with small children will receive a concrete floor in order to reduce disease caused by parasites. Some homes will also receive a new roof to improve living conditions during the rainy season (May-Nov.).

Cost per concrete floor \$275

Cost per new roof \$250

La Libertad 2

La Libertad 2 is a community located in Nueva Suyapa, a marginal neighborhood in the capital city of Tegucigalpa.

Residents earn an average of \$6-9/ week by selling food or goods on the streets, or in low income jobs such as house cleaning, guard, brick layer, washing, ironing or babysitting.

La Libertad 2 faces many challenges. Of the 120 homes, none have latrines or concrete floors, and only 23 have access to water in their homes.

CRWRC partner MCM is providing small loans to informal businesses (selling on the street, etc.), as well as empowering women to improve their self esteem, facing the challenges of being single mothers, and growing food through family and community gardens.

As part of the needs assessment, families with small children will receive a concrete floor to reduce disease caused by parasites, and to improve sanitary conditions during the rainy season (May-Nov.).

Cost per concrete floor \$275
